

Glass fiber repels soil and water and it is this quality that makes these fabrics easy to wash and quick to dry. However, it is advisable to wash glass fabrice by hand says Mrs. Helen T. Puskar, extension home furnishings specialist, The Penn-sylvania State University. Because large draperies are heavy and cumbersome to wash by hand, she suggests sending them to a commercial laundry equipped to handle draperies.
