Chicken Perfume?

Certain poultry management systems, through the exhaust fans, disseminate objectionable odors. It has been reported that a certain product, manufactured by a perfume concern in New York, will effectively control these odors immediately.

The product is Neutroleum Alpha and one (1) cc placed in a 10,000 cfm fan housing with an eyedropper will do the trick of controlling odors for 18-20 hours.

The product will not control odors outdoors or the excessive odors generated by a clean-out. It is made up of ingredients on the Federal "Generally Recognized as Safe" list.
