wheat used to pay a bricklayer for a full day of work. You know how long a bushel of wheat would pay a bricklayer today? He paused and the dairy audience laughed.

"This changed value relationship Hawbaker continued is 'why those farm houses aren't as big as they used to be'."

Hawbaker contended that the "Robin Hood approach" to government has been overdone and that "poverty has been made comfortable."

He said "We're treating poor people like we treat our dairy cattle. All we ask of them is that we eat, sleep and multiply." He added "That's not a way to solve the problem."

The only sound approach, according to Hawbaker, is one which recognizes that "the more you serve, the more you succeed" or "he who succeeds best serves best." It was this approach which made this county successful and "God help us, I hope it always remains that way."

In other comments at the banquet Miss Sue Kauffman, Lancaster County Dairy Princess, advised some steps to help stop soft drinks and liquor from pushing out milk.

The milk pitcher should be on the table as readily available as the water pitcher, serve milk punches for dessert, put no margarine on the table, serve cheeses in many forms.

Alan N. Bair, assistant Lancaster ag agent, congratulated local dairymen for the many 600 pound-plus butterfat averages.

He urged dairymen in general to spend their DHIA testing money wisely by using these records "to increase overall efficiency in the coming year."

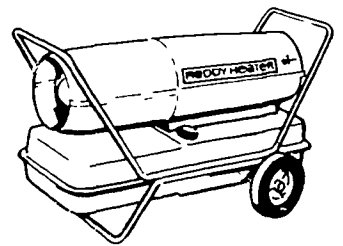
