

Butler Named Pennmarva President

Fred G. Butler, an Inwood, West Virginia dairyman, was elected president of the Pennmarva Dairymen's Cooperative Federation at its fourth annual meeting recently in Washington, D. C.

Butler, vice president of Pennmarva for the last year, succeeds Walter A. Martz, Frederick, Maryland, as president of the 5,000 member dairy farmer federation. It includes those farmers who are members of the Inter-State Milk Producers' Cooperative, Philadelphia; Maryland Cooperative Milk Producers, Baltimore; and the Maryland & Virginia Milk Producers Association, Arlington, Virginia.

Elected vice president of Pennmarva was Lester C. Jones, Medford, New Jersey, a member of Inter-State; re-elected secretary was Dr. Paul E. Hand, Warminster, Pennsylvania, Inter-State, and Boyd M. Cook, Boonsboro, Maryland, MCMP.

Wessel Jr, Hampstead, Md., representing the MCMP. R. Holmes Baker, New Windsor, Md., Walter A. Martz, Edward C. Norman, Purcellville, Va., and C. Thomas Sollenberger, Woodstock, Va. representing the MVMP.

Members of the Pennmarva Executive Committee include: Wilbur Seipt, Edward Norman and Herbert Wessel Jr. Dr. James Honan, Inter-State; Ralph L. Strock, MCMP, and James E. Click, MVMP, the manager of their respective organizations, are members of the Management Committee of Pennmarva.

Since its founding in 1968, the Pennmarva Federation has played a major role in a number of milk marketing developments in the Mid-Atlantic area. These include the merging of the three Federal Milk Marketing Orders governing the Baltimore, Philadelphia, and Washington milk markets into the single Mid-

Atlantic Order No. 4, the initiation of a 12-month's base plan and recently, action toward a market-wide milk promotion

plan financed by deductions from all milk producers shipping under the Mid Atlantic Federal Order.

This plan is the first to be approved since Federal Legislation authorized such programs. The

vote was taken of area dairy farmers, both co-op and non-coop members, January 22, 1972.
