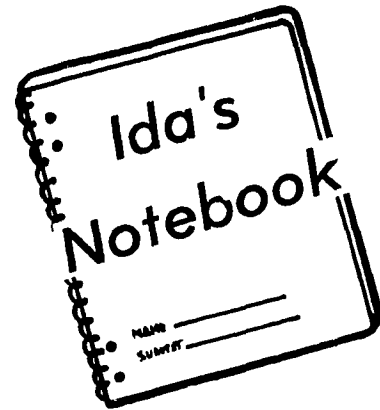
First and second degrees will be conferred at the next meeting, March 27, at 8 p.m.

So I embroider bureau scarves and I haven't learned to read and listen attentively.

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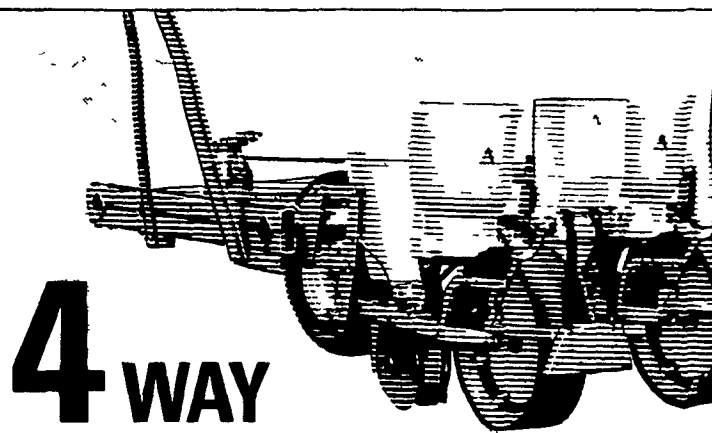
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
