Farmers Productivity Cited by Sec. Butz

Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz told the 1972 White House Conference for the Advertising Council that they couldn't have a better product to sell than the nation's generous supply of wholesome food—and the people who produce it, the nation's farmers.

"Farmers are among the hardest working people in the nation; their productivity per man hour is increasing twice as fast as in manufacturing industries, and farmers are working for a fourth less than the non-farm average income," Secretary Butz said. "Farmers are not to blame for the increase in the price of retail food. The prices they receive for food products have gone up only six per cent in the last 20 years. During that time, wages of union members in packing plants increased more than six per cent per year and are now three times




EXHIBIT TRAIN
