At the close of the business meeting Mrs John Hess entertained with her display of decorated eggs. An auction also was held.

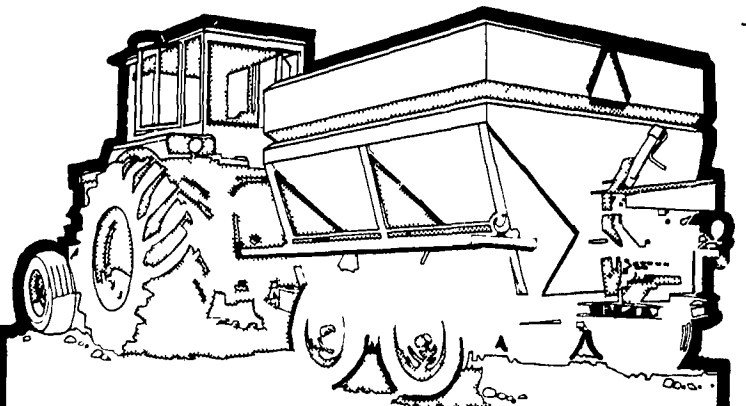
The April meeting will be held at the home of Mrs J Paul Nolt, Lancaster, on April 27.

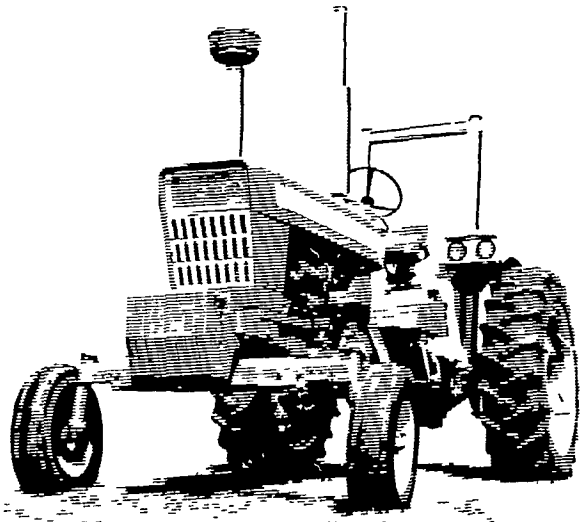
