

Dr. Ziegler to be Honored at Little International Exposition

The 55th Little International Livestock Exposition to be held April 29 at Pennsylvania State University will be dedicated to Dr. John H. Ziegler Jr, associate professor of meat science.

The exposition is sponsored annually by the Block and Bridle Club, a student organization. Club members are honoring Dr. Ziegler for his enthusiastic support of Block and Bridle Club

activities.

Dr. Ziegler devotes considerable time to teaching and advising students as well as participating in research dealing with the evaluation of meat

animal carcasses emanating from genetic, nutritional and management projects.

Ziegler has been active throughout the years on committees of the College of Agriculture concerning curriculums for undergraduate majors in animal industry, animal science, and food science. He served on many carcass show

committees and is author and co-author of numerous scientific and popular articles dealing with meats and meat animal production.

Events of the Little International will be held April 29 in the ice pavilion at University Park. Some 130 students will be competing in judging of cattle, sheep, hogs and horses

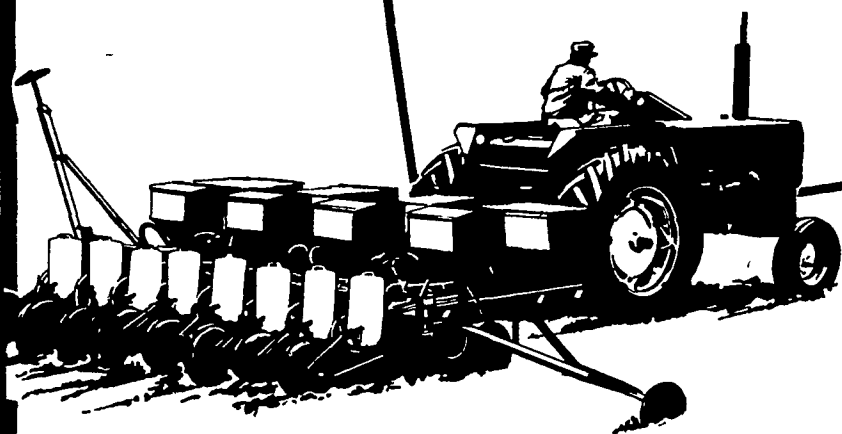

The difference of 30.4 bu.-Acre yielded, at \$1.00-bu, an additional \$30.40-Acre or \$304.00-Ton on the Ortho field over the competitive fields. Obviously, it cost me a lot of money to use the competitive 8-32-16.

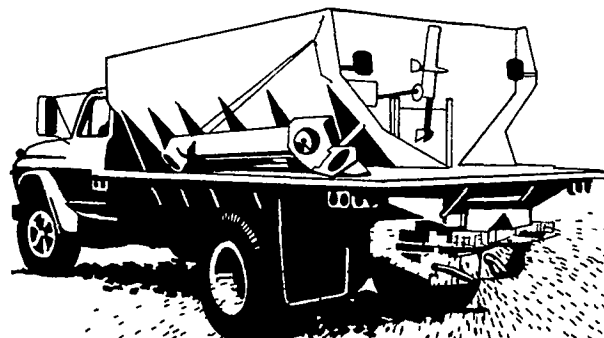

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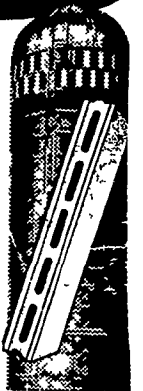
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
