Approximately 150 4-H members from the Commonwealth, including five from Lancaster County, took part in the Northeast States Invitational 4-H Teen Agricultural Leadership Conference, last week in Washington, D.C.

The conference, held in the National 4-H Center, was designed to explore career opportunities in agribusiness. become aware of the role and need for stronger agriculture leadership, and get acquainted with leaders in business, industry, government, and education. Teen leaders from five states participated.

"Those attending received scholarships to defray conference costs," said Leland G. Jinks, State 4-H Club leader at Pennsylvania State University. "Contributions came from state agricultural organizations and industries and local scholarships."


Twin Valley Young Farmers Tour Dairy Facility

A special meeting of the Twin Valley Young Farmers association was held last week at the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Brubaker Sr, Elverson RD2.


