Cattle on Feed Up Nine Per Cent

Cattle and calves on feed April 1 for slaughter market totaled 12,792,000 head in the 23 major feeding states, up nine per cent from a year earlier, according to the Crop Reporting Board.

Placements of cattle and calves in the 23 states during the January-March 1972 quarter totaled 5,876,000 head, two per cent above placements in the same quarter last year. Marketings of fed cattle during the January-March period of 6,414,000 head were three per cent more than a year earlier.

Total marketings during the April-June quarter are expected to be 6,654,000 head, six per cent greater than the same quarter in 1971.

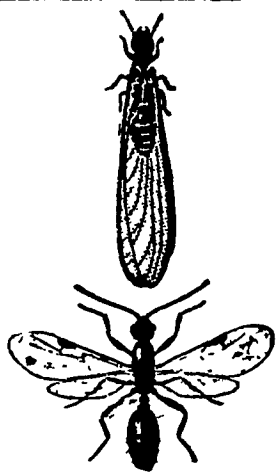
