

June 15 Deadline to Certify Crop Acreages

Farmers enrolled in the 1972 wheat and/or feed grain program must certify crop acreages by June 15, 1972.

They must report all acreage of crops planted, and designate on the aerial photos the acreage that will be set-aside to meet program requirements. Farmers are reminded that the set-aside cropland must be of equal

productivity to that used for growing crops.

A reporter will not visit the farm unless it is selected for spot-check after certification. To be sure of all acreages before certification, they should request low-cost measurement service. This will guarantee correct acreages, as well as the eligibility of the land.

Farmers are urged to visit the County ASCS office and certify as soon as all program crops are planted. Failure to certify by June 15, will mean loss of program payments.

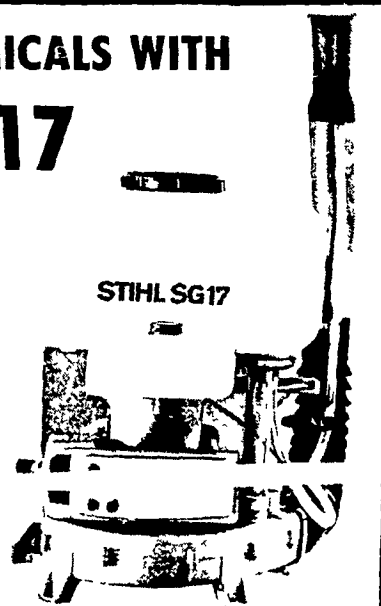

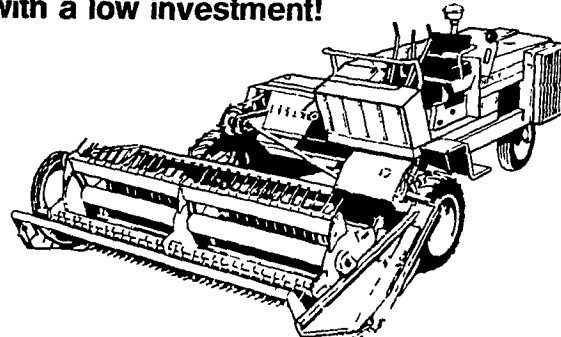
