Nutritional Guideline to be Established for Frozen Dinners

Frozen dinners processed in the future will carry a nutritional label; The Food and Drug Administration has completed nutritional guidelines for precooked, frozen heat-and-serve dinners. And the information will be carried on all packages of these foods.

The label will indicate the source of protein from meat, poultry, fish or cheese; and other ingredients such as potatoes, rice, cereal products; and vegetables other than potatoes. Minimum levels of protein. vitamin A,B vitamins, niacin and iron will also be indicated based on the caloric content.

Either of two methods of identification may be used. The statement: "The nutrient content of this product meets the Federal Nutritional Guideline established for frozen convenience heat-andservice dinners," must be carried in addition to the caloric content. Manufacturers of complying products have the alternative of no label. But products that do not meet these standards must carry a statement that they don't meet the guidelines, and in what nutrients they are deficient. Additions of two vitamins and iron can be made to meet the guidelines.

Appliance Terms Explained

Extension home management specialists at Pennsylvania State University say that the Association of Home Appliance Manufacturers has compiled a general guideline defining what terms most commonly found in directory listings mean. "Factory Service" means the appliance manufacturer owns the local company and provides service through his own employees. "Authorized,"
"authorized factory" or "factory franchised" firms are separately owned and managed but have a contract with the manufacturer to provide warranty service. "Independent" service is provided by a local company not under contract to a manufac-

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
