McGovern, McHale Discuss Ag Issues

Pennsylvania Secretary of Agriculture Jim McHale today disclosed he has received assurances from Sen. George McGovern that the Democratic presidential candidate is committed to a platform of greater farm income and rural development.

McHale said the South Dakota senator, at a recent meeting in Washington with a small group of farm leaders, pledged that one of his first acts in office would be to set Commodity Loans under the present farm program at 90 percent of the 1910-14 parity index. Currently, parity — the ratio of costs to prices received by farmers — is near the lowest level since the 1932 depression days.

McHale was invited by Sen. McGovern to attend the session on rural issues with Texas Commissioner of Agriculture John White, and representatives of the National Farmers Union, National Farmers Organization, National Wheat Growers Association, National Milk Producers Federation, National Catholic Rural Life Conference and National Rural Electric Cooperatives Association.

McGovern asked each farm leader for his views.

"I told the senator," said McHale, "that one of our greatest needs today is to boost farm

income for the family farmer, to keep him solvent because he is a vital part of any plant to rebuild rural America.

"I was pleased to hear the Senator repeat a pledge he made in Miami that he would boost commodity loans to their maximum of 90 percent of the 1910-1914 parity index.

"I asked the Senator," McHale continued, "for a national commitment to revitalize and recapitalize everything in rural America. We must break up control of farm lands by non-farm monopolies and begin the task of improving the quality of life for all of rural America through more and better housing and improved health delivery system, better transportation and the creation of more jobs in the private and public sector"

McHale also discussed Pennsylvania's flood situation with McGovern, noting there was a need for a larger program of assistance for the victims of the June flood caused by tropical storm Agnes.

McGovern has introduced a bill that would cut interest rates on loans to flood hit individuals, businesses and farms to a flat 1 percent and increase the forgiveness factor from \$2,500 to \$15,000. Currently, loans carry interest rates of up to about 5½ percent.

Fed Cattle Dip 5 pct.

The July 1, 1972 inventory of cattle and calves on feed at 54,000 is down about five percent from last year, according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service.

All of the decline is attributed to a sharp rise in the number of head marketed during the second quarter of the year, 47,000 head or 24 percent more than during the same period in 1971.

Cattle feeders added to their stock during the same quarter another 20,000 head which was an increase of 25 percent against last year's activity. Marketings in the July-September quarter should show a modest three percent gain over 1971.

The Crop Reporting Service, a cooperative venture among farmers, the Pa. Department and the USDA, surveys only full-scale cattle feeding, excluding small operations incidental to dairy and general farming.
