## Happy Homemaking

When making a lot of hors d'oeuvres for a party, make a tray out of two thicknesses of cardboard and cover with aluminum foil. So they can be stacked in the refrigerator, cut paper towel cardboard rollers into pieces that can stand up as supports for trays on top. Cover with plastic wrap and they will stay fresh until time for serving.

To make a party-size relish tray, a good idea is to secure a small bowl with florists' clay in the middle of a large chop dish. Place dip or spread in the bowl and arrange your other appetizers around the edge of the platter.

When you find it necessary to put two card tables together for extra company, hold the tables together with strong rubber bands on adjoining legs. This eliminates danger of spills because the tables can't slip apart.

A tin muffin pan can be painted with bright enamel

and used for serving beverages. Glasses won't tip over and serving is made much easier.

Before entertaining at a shower, purchase a small, inexpensive name-and-address book. As the guests arrive, ask them to write or print their names and addresses in the book. The list will be helpful to the honored guest when she sends out "thank you" notes.

A bowl of vinegar will do wonders to remove smoke from the air when giving a party. Conceal it by putting artificial flowers in the bowl. A water lily floating in a brandy snifter of white vinegar makes a pretty decoration.

If a friend or acquaintance mentions a favorite food, do make a note of it. If this person is a guest in your house at a later date, he or she will be amazed and pleased that you remembered.

Wood paneling may be cleaned with a solution made up of four tablespoons vinegar, two tablespoons olive oil and one pint of warm water. This mixture is easy on the hands and leaves a nice finish on the paneling.

The metal runner in shower doors can be cleaned by using a cloth soaked in vinegar and then dipped in baking soda. Wash off the cleaning agent with lots of hot water. The runner will be sparkling clean and the door will slide easily.

Candy or caramel apples may be taken to bake sales in waxed paper sandwich bags which have been buttered on the inside.

To remove chewing gum from a pair of trousers, freeze the area with an ice cube and scrape gum off with a dull knife. Then use cigarette lighter fluid on the remaining spot.

When sending a parcel post package to a family with a baby, use disposable diapers to fill in the open spaces rather than tissue or newspaper. When the package arrives the diapers can be used, as well as the other contents of the box.

Hanging flower pots may be fitted with corks that fit in the drainage holes in the bottoms. When the plants are being watered, the corks should be put in the holes. The corks are removed after the plant has had a good soaking.

Golf tees may be used to stop window rattles in the winter. The tees are easy to insert in the proper places in the frame. They will not show and certainly do stop the noise.

### Seven Signs

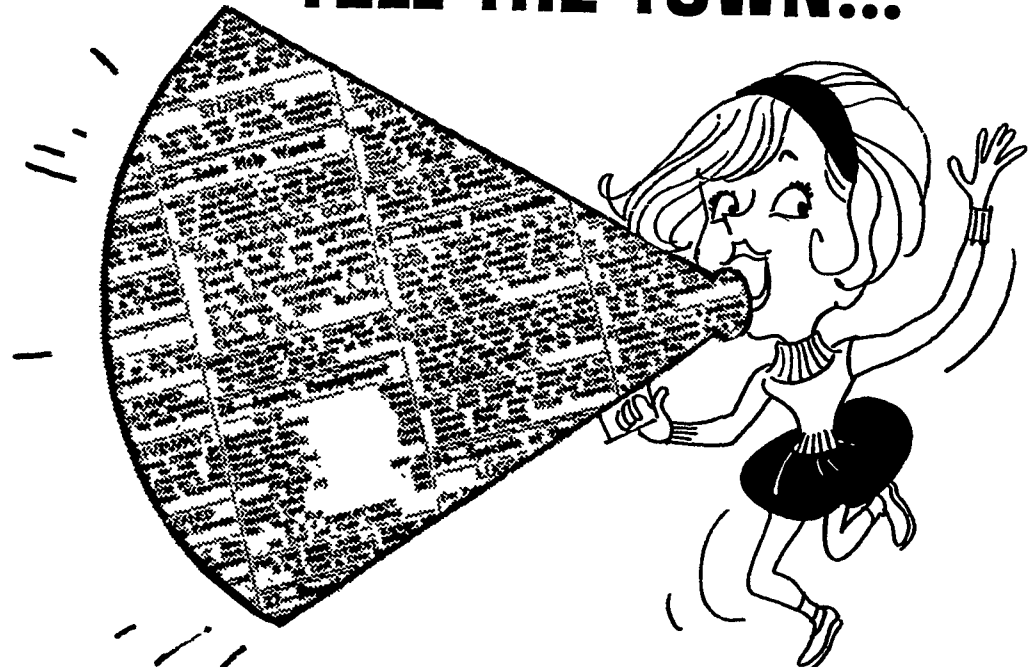
