During the afternoon, a record number of sheep and swine were judged. A total of 57 market hogs and nine breeding swine were exhibited along with 39 sheep.

Stephen Horton, 11, showed the grand champion market hog, a 226 pound crossbred. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Horton, of Elizabethtown.

Stephs' champion hog was a litter-mate of a hog he showed to the championship of the 4-H county hog roundup during the summer.

The reserve grand champion market hog was shown by Stuart Heisey of Elizabethtown R1.

In judging of pairs, Dwight Martin, of Mount Joy R1, had the champions and Kerry Boyd, of Clay, the reserve champions. Rick Pfautz, of Stevens R1, exhibited the champion sow, a Duroc. No reserve champion was named.

Scott Heisey, of Elizabethtown R1, won the junior fitting and showmanship award and Marlin Becker, of Manheim R2, the senior showmanship award of the hog show.

With six breeds of sheep in competition, the Robert Herr family, of Narvon R1, swept all top prizes.

Elizabeth Herr, 12, showed the champion pen of three lambs, winning with her black-faced Suffolk sheep.

The champion market lamb was shown by her brother, Christian 10, who exhibited Dorsets.

In dairy competition on Thursday evening, Linda and Sue Kauffman led their Holstein cows to grand and reserve grand championships, respectively. The girls are daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kauffman, Elizabethtown R1.

Linda also had the top 4-H cow, and Sue was named the champion showman of the fair.

A third member of the family, Steve, 10, showed his calf to first place in the senior calf class. Another Kauffman cow placed first as a senior yearling and was named junior champion.

In judging of dairy herds, Kauffmans had the best three females as well as the champion produce and dam.

The fitting championship for exhibiting the cleanest animals, went to Marlene Harbold, of Elizabethtown R1.

Other first place cows in the Holstein judging were shown by Russel Kline, of Reinholds, with both a junior calf and a two-year

old cow; Marlene Harbold, an intermediate calf that was also junior champion; Larry Wenger with his junior yearling and Frank Eshleman, with a four-year old.

Ken Findley, 19, of Holtwood R2, showed both the grand and reserve grand champion Jerseys.

John Miller, of Elm, was another double winner, taking both grand and reserve champion honors in Guernseys. Miller's cows were entered as FFA projects.

Top honors in judging of Brown Swiss also went to one showman, Don Wenger, of Manheim R2, an FFA student who has won almost every show entered this year with his seven-year old grand champion and reserve champion junior yearling.

In a window display contest conducted Wednesday, the Penn Manor FFA chapter took first place with a display explaining pesticide safety principles.

Manheim came in second with a wagon safety display, Ephrata was third with wildlife conservation, and the Manheim FHA was fourth with a colorful display on recycling remnants.

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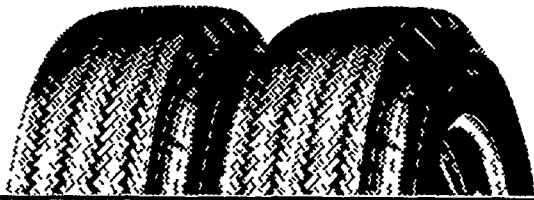
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Weaver Promotes Wagner and Trout
