36 per cent, cows 9 percent,
feeders 12 percent Overall finish
steers and heifers attractive with
a liberal percentage Choice and
moderate volume high-Choice
and Prime Mud still in evidence
but not as prevalent as the
previous week. Fed cattle trade
fairly active even in face of
rather liberal marketings and a
slow moving early carcass trade
Most buying interests came into
week with modest inventories on
hand accompanied by a broad
demand Good outlet for cattle to
be slaughtered at points outside
the immediate Omaha area

Average cost slaughter steers
first three days 39.06, this highest
price of record locally, average
weight 1106 pounds as compared
38 89 and 1140 pounds previous
week and 34.67 and 1132 pounds a
year ago.

FEEDERS: Outshipments
approximately 2,700 as compared
