### **Bird Movement Permission**

The US Department of Agriculture announced changes in its quarantine regulations which will allow owners of caged pet birds to move them from areas under Federal quarantine for poultry disease such as exotic Newcastle

The change will alleviate hardships experienced by traveling pet bird owners because of quarantines imposed in southern California and Puerto Rico by USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) to halt the spread of exotic Newcastle disease of poultry and other birds

APHIS officials explained that the changes will permit a bird owner to transport two caged pet birds out of a quarantine area. In order to transport the birds, the owner has to meet two requirements

-Present a notarized statement to quarantine authorities that the birds have been in the owner's possession for at least 90 days, that the birds are healthy, and they have not been in contact with poultry or other birds during that period

- Keep the birds in isolation for 30 days after they are moved and make them available for inspection by State or Federal authorities
