"I believe in leadership from ourselves." Today farming families cannot afford to let someone else make the decisions that affect their communities. For far too long non-agricultural interests have had the loudest voice in matters that directly affected the farm: zoning boards, township governments, boards of adjustments.


What must we do? We must become active members of those agencies that exert an influence within the community. How then





can the Agricultural program that is offered in many schools help? By teaching more than just production agriculture subjects. By teaching a young man or woman to think and to speak. By preparing the agriculture students to stand and speak, we as teachers may be helping more towards providing the leadership that is needed.

Production agriculture will teach a student about soils and their properties, land uses and management, pollution and



controls, money management and planning. These areas of information can be transferred directly, and with much benefit to those agencies that make the decisions that farmers must live with.

If the agricultural community is to continue as a strong segment in Lancaster, then the farming community must encourage those people within its scope to become the loudest and best informed voices on those agencies that make the decisions.

If the agricultural community accepts this responsibility then it will have leadership from itself and respect from others, and will serve itself as well as the public interest.


