Milk and butterfat production levels established by three Registered Holstein cows in the herd of Jefferson D. Yoder, Elverson RD1, have been reported by the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

Cows recognized for their exceptional food producing ability are:

Rocky-Side Fond Hope 6926889, four-years-old, 19,130 pounds of milk, 785 pounds of butterfat in 363 days; Rocky-Side Star Lida 7225145, three-years five-months, 18,790 pounds of milk, 781 pounds of butterfat in 305 days, and Rocky-Side Star June 6926877, four-years six-months, 21,300 pounds of milk, 632 pounds of butterfat in 305 days.

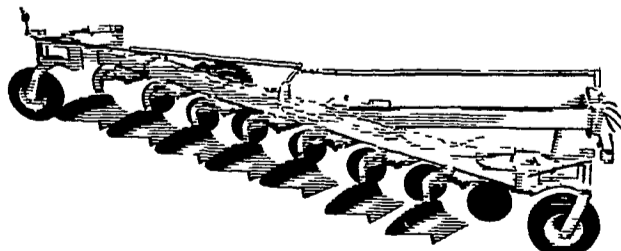
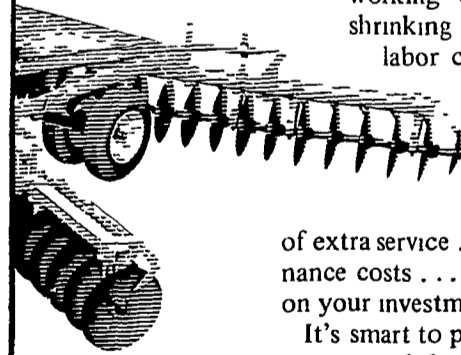
