

Manheim Man Elected Officer At Turfgrass Conference

Two prominent turfgrass specialists were cited for achievements during the annual Turfgrass Conference held recently at The Pennsylvania State University. Honored were Dr. Fred V. Grau of College Park, Md., and Dr. Joseph M. Duich of University Park. Each received a service award plaque from the Pennsylvania Turfgrass Council.

Elected president of the Pennsylvania Turfgrass Council was Martin Stolpe of New Castle. The new first vice-president is David O. Miller of Bethlehem. Second vice-president is Robert Hummer of Manheim. Treasurer is David Boyd, Jr., of New Wilmington. Continuing as executive director is Dr. Grau.

Named directors of the Council were Clyde Lyons of West Middlesex, Craig Monroe of Somerset, Richard Valentine of Ardmore, William Helbling of Pittsburgh, Levi Travis of Hawley, and C. William Black of Hagerstown, Md.

The Penn State Turfgrass Conference was dedicated to Russell A. Smith, turfgrass research technician at the University for 36 years. Due to illness, Smith was unable to attend but was represented at a testimonial dinner by brother John, vegetable technician, who has served Penn State for 37 years, and brother William,

floricultural technician, who served the University for 42 years. Regrettably, Russell Smith died two days after the conference.

The service award to Dr. Grau recognized his outstanding contributions and devotion to furthering the turfgrass industry both at home and abroad—especially for his most recent contribution as executive director of the Pennsylvania Turfgrass Council.

Dr. Grau was born on a farm in Nebraska in 1902. He received his BS degree at the University of Nebraska in 1931 working on golf courses to finish college. In 1931-33 he became a research assistant for the U.S. Golf Association Green Section, Arlington, Va. He received his MS degree at the University of Maryland in 1933 and his PhD degree at the University of Maryland in 1935.

Dr. Grau worked in Pennsylvania as an extension

agronomist at Pennsylvania State College from 1935 to 1945. He traveled to Europe in 1937 on the Fourth International Grasslands Congress Tour. During 1941-42 he worked for The War Department in Washington helping with dust erosion control.

As U.S. Golf Association Green Section director at Beltsville, Maryland, he was intimately involved with the development and release of improved turfgrasses; Merion Bluegrass, Meyer Zoysia, U.S. Bermudagrass, and Ugandagrass. He discovered Penngift crown vetch, a legume used extensively today as a ground cover along roadsides.

Dr. Joseph M. Duich was honored with a service award plaque for his outstanding dedication as a turfgrass teacher and researcher. Dr. Duich has taught at Penn State for more than 13 years and is responsible for the success of the Turfgrass Short Course Program which to

date has involved students from 22 states, Canada and Mexico.

Dr. Duich was born in Farrell, Pennsylvania. He received his BS and PhD at The Pennsylvania State University. He has made numerous professional contributions in the form of guidelines and specifications for building golf courses and athletic fields. Most of the sod industry began to expand after Dr.

Duich's work on the stability of the genetics of Merion Bluegrass had been documented.

Dr. Duich was breeder or co-breeder of Pennstar Kentucky Bluegrass, Pennpar creeping bent and Pennfine perennial ryegrass. His liaison with seed growers, industry, and control officials has contributed to higher standards and better understanding with the turf industry.

Backing this filmed essay on the growth and development of America are an original score by Richard Rodgers and folk music sung by the Roger Wagner Chorale.
