

The latest Agricultural Census, for 1969, shows a substantial increase in the average output per farm for the egg and broiler industries since the 1964 Census ... and a drop in the number of producing units

The number of farms reporting chicken flocks declined 60 percent from 1964 to 1969-from 12 million farms to 471,000 These flocks were mainly laying hens and replacement pullets. Average number of birds per faim went up more than 275 percent-trom an average of 283 chickens per farm

While the number of farms selling broilers and other meat chickens fell about 4 percent to 33,700, the number of birds per farm rose more than 30 percent from 54,500 to 72,000.


