Poultry Poll

There are more chickens under fewer roofs than ever before.

The latest Agricultural Census, for 1969, shows a substantial increase in the average output per farm for the egg and broiler industries since the 1964 Census . . . and a drop in the number of producing units.

The number of farms reporting chicken flocks declined 60 percent from 1964 to 1969—from 1.2 million farms to 471,000. These flocks were mainly laying hens and replacement pullets. Average number of birds per farm went up more than 275 percent—from an average of 283 chickens per farm to 785.

While the number of farms selling broilers and other meat chickens fell about 4 percent to 33,700, the number of birds per farm rose more than 30 percent from 54,700 to 72,000.

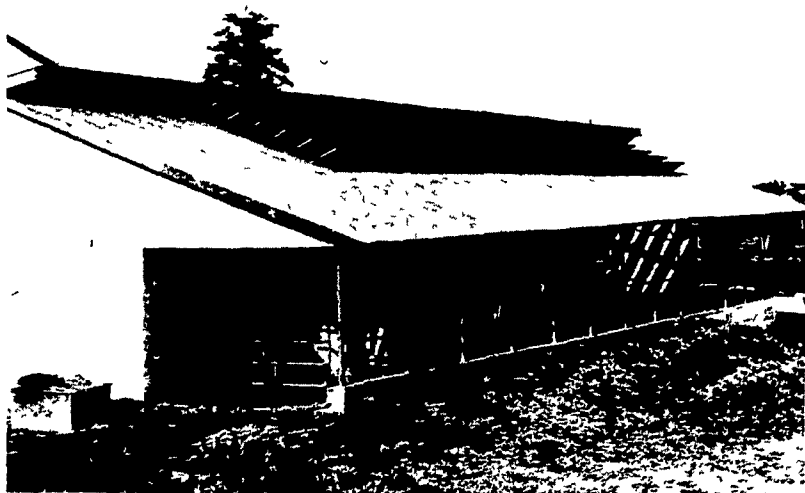

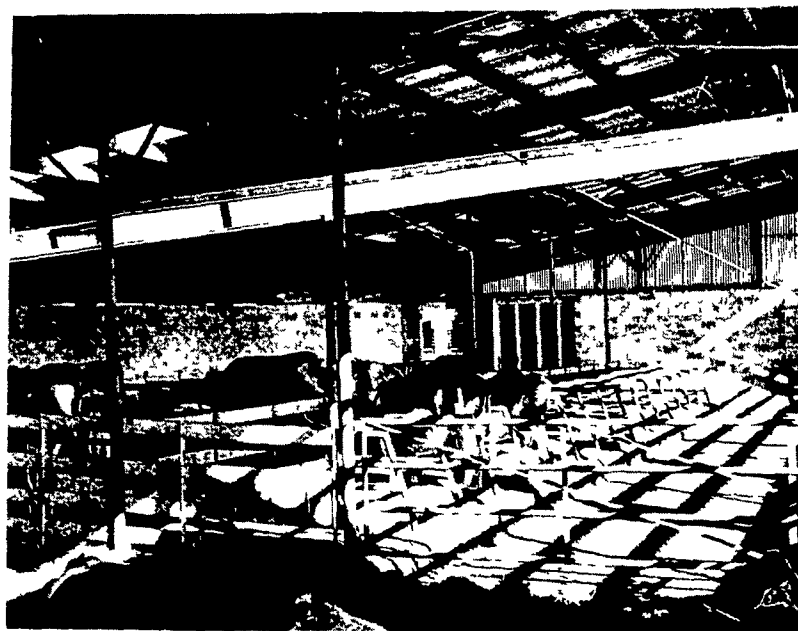

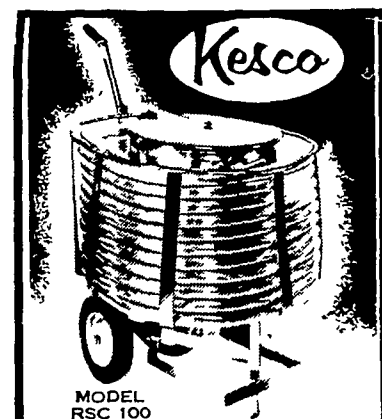
