PSU Expanding Natural Resources Program

Programs to train young persons for improved management of natural resources are expanding within the College of Agriculture at The Pennsylvania State University, an official announced today.

Such programs are developing due to concern for potential danger to land, water, and air, says Dr. J. K. Pasto, Associate Dean for Resident Education in the College of Agriculture.

Leading the expansion is a new four-year major in environmental resource management, started in the fall of 1971, which has exceeded all expectations in student interest. Presently about 160 students are enrolled at University Park with an additional 35 or 40 students involved as freshmen and sophomores at the Commonwealth campuses.

The program is inter-

departmental with students advised by seven faculty members in five different departments. Courses include subjects that cut across the usual departmental boundaries, such as pollution of environmental systems, ecology of plant production, legal aspects of resource management, and case studies ecosystem management

Course work from several disciplines is integrated into a coherent study of the improved use and management of natural resources, Dr. Pasto expalins. Ten special courses were developed to expand, amplify, and provide in-depth training in the management of environmental problems

The first graduates will be qualified to work with regulatory agencies at the federal, state, county, or municipal level. Because of constraints being imposed upon industry for environmental pollution, industry may well become a key source of employment for such graduates.

The "new look" in environmental education is included in a special issue of "Science in Agriculture," the quarterly magazine of the Agricultural Experiment Station at Penn State. Emphasis is given

to problems, and solutions. related to pollution of land, water, and air. 




