**Fix-It Tip**

Gutters and downspouts are often in bad shape in the spring just when you need them most. This interferes with the pitch of the gutter, causing water to stand instead of flowing.

Tighten the metal straps that hold the gutters in place. If spikes are used, remove and renew where necessary. Clean out the dirt that has accumulated during the winter. Sand, prime and paint rust spots as soon as weather is warm enough.

Damaged area should be repaired with the same kind of metal or fiberglass. Coat the patch with roof cement.

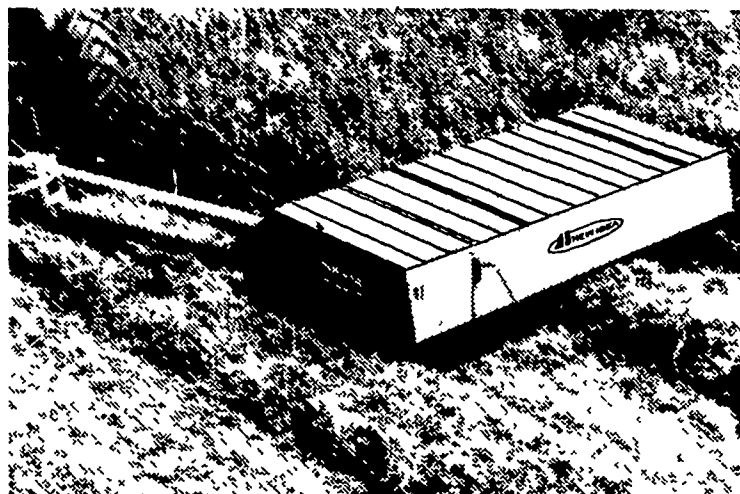

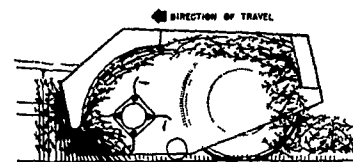

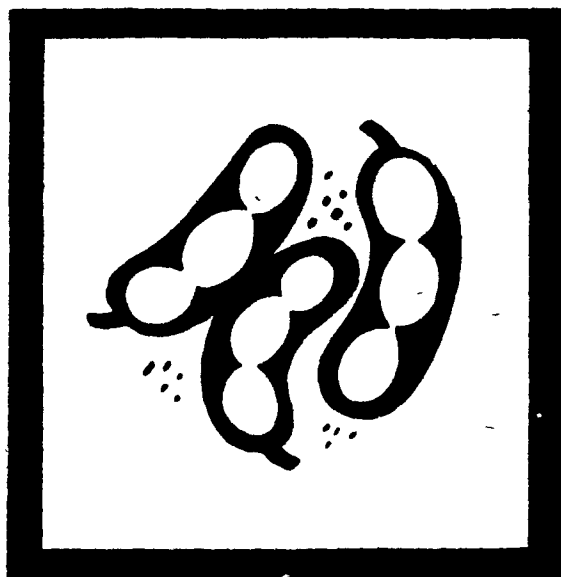
