Purchase, Loan Rates For Rye Announced


County loan and purchase rate schedules for eligible 1973-crop rye were issued ooCounty loan and purchase rate schedules for eligible 1973-crop rye were issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

The 1973 county loan rates are based on a national average loan level of 89 cents per bushel (the same level as for 1972) for rye grading No. 2 or better, or No. 3 on the factors of test weight only, announced Dec. 11, 1972 (see USDA press release 4023-72). County loan rates are established to reflect historical rye prices received by farmers and will

vary depending on location. The county loan rates in Colorado were increased two cents to improve the loan rate relationships with neighboring states in the major rye producing area, USDA officials said.

Copies of 1973-crop rye county loan rates are being sent to states and will also be available from the Grain Division, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

Schools participating in the contest were: Ephrata, Elizabethtown, Solanco, Penn Manor, New Holland, Manheim, Oxford, Warwick, and Octoraro. Agriculture teachers from the participating schools served as judges.


After the opening procedures the new members filled out enrollment cards. Club leader, J. Warren Heisey, commented on
