# **PSU Reports Growing Degree** Days, Rainfall

A report from Penn State of weekly crop and weather roundups with a report on weather conditions for the week ending May 14.

In Lancaster, the average temperature for the week was 61 degrees, no departure from the normal average for the time of year.

Growing degree days for crops that start at 50-degrees totaled 255 degrees, or 63 more than in an average year.

Rainfall for the week totaled .19 inches; rainfall since April 1 totaled 6.28 inches, or .93 more than normal.
