The members of Solanco FFA are again this year conducting a Pheasant Project. Each year many ringneck pheasants, quail, doves, and other small animals and birds choose the farmer's hay and grain fields to nest and raise their young.

Through no fault of the farmer, many of these creatures are destroyed during the nesting season when the first hay is cut. The Solanco FFA hopes to help

this situation by incubating abandoned or orphan pheasant eggs.

The eggs will be hatched, records kept on the number hatched, and the young will be released again when they are old enough.

Safety Council Lists Causes of Most Farm Fires

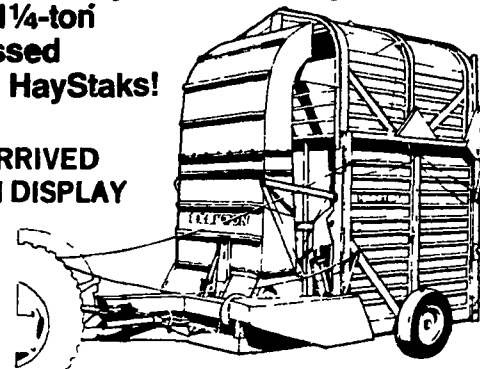

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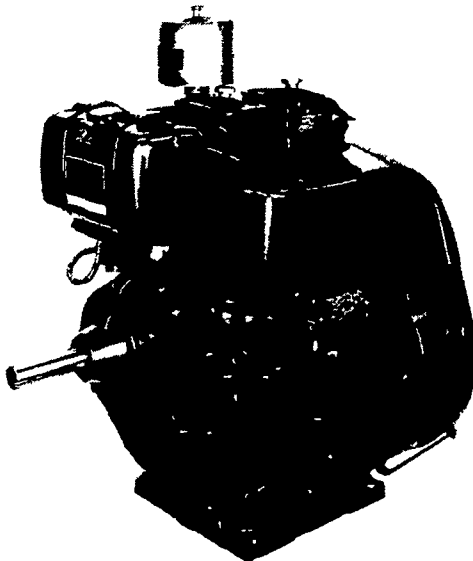
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
