How fire-safe is your home? Most homeowners are careful not to overload electrical circuits, store combustible waste materials, or leave fireplaces unscreened. But there are other basic fire-safety measures that should be built into a home to assure maximum safeguards against the threat of fire.

One of the most important is fire-resistant roofing. The National Fire Protection Association has for years urged enactment of community codes that prohibit use of readily combustible roofing.

An increasing number of communities do require roofing that qualifies as fire-resistant. Such roofing includes asphalt shingles, tile, slate, metal, asbestos cement, asphalt roll roofing, and chemically-treated wood shingles.

Other built-in structural fire-safety factors are:

- Walls of non-combustible materials such as plaster, gypsum or asbestos-cement. Insulation should be fire-resistant.
- Doors that are solid (not hollow core) and tight-fitting enough to hold back fire and smoke.
- · Windows large and low enough to serve as emergency exits, and easily opened even by children.



### Pa. Broiler Placements Rise 7 pct.

Placements of broiler chicks in the Commonwealth during the week ending June 2, 1973 were 1,322,000. The placements were 7 percent above the corresponding week a year earlier, but 9 percent below the previous week. Average placements during the past 10 weeks were 9 percent above a year earlier.

Settings for broiler chicks were 1,910,000 - 15 percent below the previous week and 13 percent above the comparable period a year earlier. The current 3-week total of eggs set is 10 percent above the same period a year

Inshipments of broiler-type chicks during the past 10 weeks averaged 8,000 compared with 12,000 a year ago.

Outshipments averaged 282,000 during the past 10 weeks, 6 percent above a year earlier.

Placements in the 21 States were 63,153,000 - approximately the same as the previous week but 1 percent below the same week a year earlier. Average placements during the past 10 weeks were 3 percent below a year ago.

Settings were 77,464,000, approximately the same as the previous week but 2 percent below a year earlier. The current 3-week total of eggs set is 2 percent below the comparable period a year ago.


