Weekly 51 - Cattle

Compared with last week's close: prices on slaughter steers and heifers stood 75-1.50 higher through midweek but a late decline left prices strong to 50 cents higher. Cows were mostly 50-1.00 lower. Bulls fully steady. Feeder cattle were 50-1.00 higher, part of the early upturn a reflection of higher slaughter

prices. Four day receipts 12,600 as compared 17,800 previous week and 17,000 a year ago. After a period of uneasy waiting for some word promising relief from present ceiling limitations on carcass beef the live trade spurred into action by curtailed supplies and the apparent hopeful assumption that at least some advance in prices would be allowed. However, much of the early upturn was erased in late trading in the wake of the announcement of the phase IV program. Virtually all packing interests came into the week needing cattle for immediate requirements and live prices advanced sharply in a scramble for numbers to maintain even reduced slaughter quotas. The available supply of market ready cattle was in strong hands with many feeders clinging to a "wait

and see" attitude. STEERS: load high-Choice and Prime 1086 pounds 3-4 50.00 at midweek and eight loads same grade 1026-1351 3-4 49.50-49.85. In Lancaster, the average temperature for the week was 76 degrees, a 2 degree departure from normal temperatures.

Growing degrees days for crops that start at 50 degrees totaled 1,418 degrees or 54 more than in an average year.

Rainfall for the week totaled .44 inches; rainfall for the season since April 1 totaled 16.83 inches or 2.94 inches more than normal.
