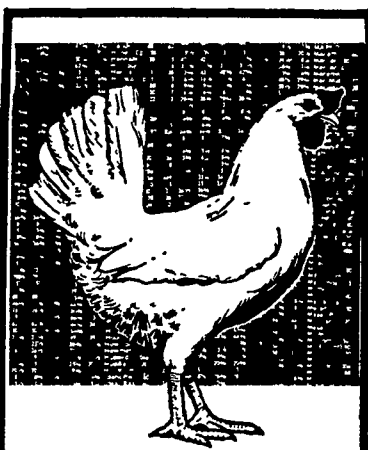

Fix-It Tip

Take a good look at metal items that are left outdoors — lawn furniture, toys and forgotten garden tools. If rust has formed on a painted surface, sand down to the bare metal prime with a rust preventative paint and finish with enamel.

The best way to protect metal items is with wax. Use auto wax since it is designed to withstand weathering. Apply a light film of oil to tools, even those in the basement. Moisture-laden air will rust them.

The spigot at the bottom of the water heater is there to prevent corrosion. Drain a pail or two of water every month, stop when the water runs clear. Never drain the tank completely since the air that gets in will cause faster corroding.

Omaha Cattle

Thursday, August 9

Compared with last week's close: Closing slaughter steer prices 2.00-2.50 higher, heifers 2.75-3.00 higher. Cows closed 25-50c lower and bulls steady. Feeder cattle strong to 1.00 higher.

Four day receipts 12,000 as compared 9,100 previous week and 16,300 a year ago. Slaughter steers approximately 32 percent, heifers 36 percent, mainly Good to average Choice, a moderate volume high-Choice and Prime. Cows 18 percent, feeders 15 percent.

Demand continued broad for the limited supply of slaughter cattle offered. Marketings expanded slightly but there was still resistance to resumption of a normal pattern so long as Phase IV remained in effect. Although some major packing plants remained inactive a number were edging back into the market with some local packing interests buying largely for custom slaughter. Canadian buying interests again participated but advancing prices were somewhat of a deterrent to purchases for export. Feeder buyers competed aggressively for fleshy two-way steers Monday but demand narrowed later.

STEERS: Three loads high-Choice and Prime 1020-1266 pounds 3-4 56.00-56.50, load same grade 1250 pounds 55.75. Near ten loads Choice and Prime 1110-1236 3-4 55.25-55.50. Choice 975-1250 2-4 closed 53.50-55.00. Mixed Good and Choice 950-1225 53.00-53.50. Good 48.50-53.00 including 2-3 Holsteins 48.50-49.00. Standard and low-Good 47.00-48.50.

Average cost slaughter steers first three days 53.93, average weight 1107 pounds as compared 51.00 and 1113 pounds previous week and 36.26 and 1112 pounds a year ago.

HEIFERS: Two loads and part load high-Choice and Prime 3-4 979-1074 pounds 53.75-54.00.

Numerous loads Choice and Prime 876-1097 3-4 53.00-53.50. Choice 825-1050 2-4 51.25-52.75. Mixed Good and Choice 750-1000 50.00-51.25. Good 45.00-50.00.

Small lots Standard and low-Good 43.50-45.00.

COWS: Utility and Commercial mainly 37.00-39.00, a few 39.75-40.00. Canner and Cutter 33.50-37.00, mixed Cutter and low-Utility 37.25-37.50.

BULLS: Yield grade 1-2 1400-2100 pounds 41.00-44.50, Grade 1 45.00-46.00, individual 48.00.

FEEDERS: Feeder prices strong to 1.00 higher, the supply largely fleshy two-way steers. Many cattle eligible for Choice grade slaughter. Outshipments approximately 1,500 compared with 1,700 previous week.

STEERS: Choice fleshy 1028-1074 pounds 54.00-55.00. High-Good and Choice 884-1080 52.00-53.50. Several lots low-Good 1050-1108 Holsteins 48.00-48.50.

HEIFERS: A few sales high-Good and Choice 727-847 pounds 48.00-51.50.
