

Dr. Baylor Speaker at Hay Convention

The 78th Annual Convention of The National Hay Association, Inc. begins with the directors meeting today (August 18th) at the Troy Hilton Inn, Troy, Mich.

Neil Trainor of Utica, Mich., president of the trade association of hay shippers, dealers, receivers, brokers, farm implement manufacturers and other businesses and individuals interested in the commercial hay industry, will call the business meeting to order on Monday morning, August 20th at 8:45.

The convention program is planned around the theme, "What's Ahead for the Hay Industry". The lead off speaker on this general subject will be Dr. John E. Baylor, Extension agronomist, Pennsylvania State University.

Baylor will review the progress made in marketing hay based on

a system different from that of U.S.D.A. Grades. He will have on display hay samples identified with the chemical analysis of these bales.

Dr. Baylor is secretary-treasurer, American Forage and Grassland Council. The Council has for years been active in promoting production of quality hay. The National Hay Association is a member of the AF&GC.

Among the speakers to follow Baylor are N.H.A. members S. K. Neal, executive vice-president, San Joaquin Valley Hay growers Association, Tracy, California, and Ronald T. Anderson, Anderson Hay & Grain Company, Ellensburg, Washington. Neal's subject is "Progress Report on Marketing Alfalfa Hay with Quality Determined by Laboratory Analysis".

Anderson will speak on, "My Experience in Marketing Hay Based on Chemical Analysis."

Papers that emphasize the importance of increasing the efficiency of hay harvesting and baling will be presented by David H. Diebold of Deere & Company, Perry Roberson of Hesston Corporation and Pat Minnihan of Vermeer Manufacturing Company.

"Hay, Heifers and Humanity", is the subject to be covered by Dr. Donald Hillman, Extension specialist in dairy science, Michigan State University.

A paper, "What's Ahead for Hay in the Southeast", will be presented by Dr. James L. Butler, Agricultural Research Service, Tifton, Georgia.

N.H.A. vice-president Arnold Poppe will report on his attendance in Oxford, England at

the First International Green Crop Drying Congress held last April. Second vice-president Robert Horton will make the statistical report. This report, made at each convention, will bring members up-to-date on areas of surplus and deficit supply.

Plans for the ladies include visiting historical sights and shopping tours, a dinner theater in Windsor, Ontario and the usual convention banquet and dance on Monday night.

The convention will be adjourned on Tuesday after completing the business session, receiving reports from convention Committees and the election of officers and directors for the coming year.
