Handiwork and baked goods exhibits are located on the first floor of the Community Building and flowers in the basement. The Community Building will be demolished by next year and the association will use the fire hall. Art, some farm crops, fruit, nuts and canned goods are in the office building. There are two commercial tents and the animals, fresh vegetables and eggs are in tents.

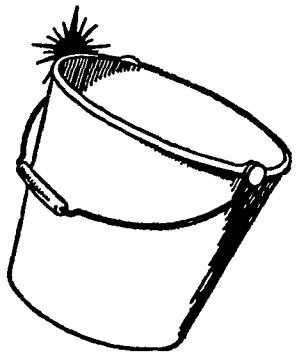
Grace is married to Rev. William Emery III who is pastor of Eastminster Presbyterian

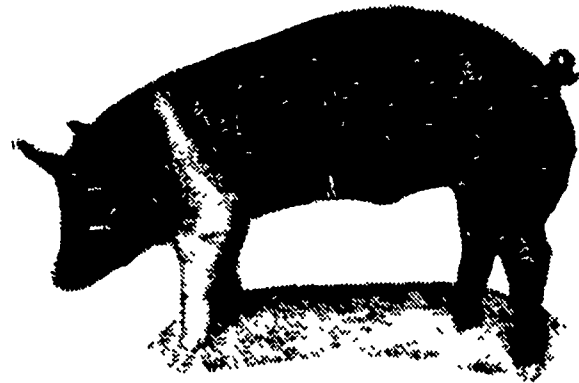
