# Pa. Broiler Placements Rise 9 pct.

Placements of broiler chicks in the Commonwealth during the week ending August 25, 1973 were 1,237,000. The placements were 9 percent above the corresponding week a year earlier, but 6 percent below the previous week. Average placements during the past 10 weeks were 9 percent above a year earlier.

Settings for broiler chicks were 1,961,000 - 4 percent above the previous week and 9 percent above the comparable period a year earlier. The current 3-week total of eggs set is 6 percent above the same period a year

Inshipments of broiler-type chicks during the past 10 weeks were zero compared with 28,000 a Outshipments ago. averaged 304,000 during the past 10 weeks, 17 percent above a year

Placements in the 21 States were 57,554,000 — 1 percent below the previous week and 1 percent above the same week a year earlier. Average placements during the past 10 weeks were 4 percent below a year ago. Settings were 70,930,000, approximately the same as the


