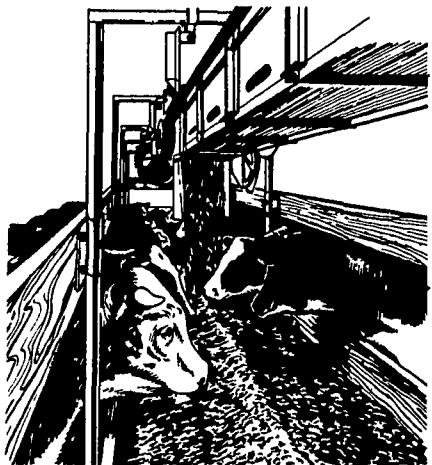

Sorghum Amendment Proposed

Amendment of the U.S. Standards for Grain Sorghum was proposed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) said the proposed changes would:

— shorten the term "grain sorghum" to "sorghum," which is the more officially recognized name.

— redefine the class Yellow Sorghum to include sorghum with white seedcoats. The present definition permits mixtures of yellow, salmon-pink, and red sorghum to be graded as Yellow Sorghum.

— redefine the class White Sorghum so the maximum limit for sorghum with seedcoats of other colors would be two percent, instead of the present 10 percent. This change would restrict the quantity of other colors that can be mixed with white sorghum and still be classified as White Sorghum.

Other changes are proposed for

the purpose of clarity.

AMS officials said the proposed changes have been discussed informally with the grain industry. Official grading is provided under the U.S. Grain Standards Act upon request of an applicant, usually a buyer or seller, for a fee to cover the cost of the service. Grading is required when the grain is sold by grade for export.

A Notice of Proposed Rule Making was scheduled to be published in the September 5 issue of the Federal Register. Comments and suggestions on the proposed changes, which will be available for public inspection, should be submitted in duplicate to the Hearing Clerk, Room 112-A, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250, not later than October 20.

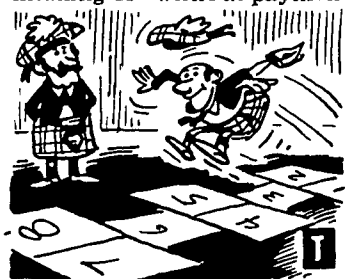

"Scottish" Spoken Here

The term "scot free" has nothing to do with Scotland or the Scottish people, according to the Teacher's Scotch Information Centre.

In Shakespeare's day and before, a "scot" (or "sceot," as it was originally spelled) was a municipal tax, one paid to a sheriff. The present-day meaning of "without payment



of a just penalty" can be traced to the "scot free" persons of Elizabethan England who managed successfully to dodge paying their taxes.

The Scotsman, though he has a well earned reputation for caniness and frugality, has equally well earned his reputation for facing up to his just obligations. Thus he is in no way libeled by the phrase "scot free."

There are at least two other apparently "Scotch" terms in English... "hopscotch" and "Scotch verdict." The following facts should help you to scotch any rumors about them.

Hopscotch is an old English children's game. The player hops from one division to another of a diagram marked—or scotched—upon the ground, kicking a stone, or tile, with the foot on which he hops.

And a "Scotch verdict" is one "not proven." Although in English and American law a jury in a criminal case is required to bring in a verdict of "guilty" or "not guilty," Scottish statutes allow this third choice.

That's the law... and the lore.

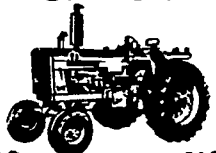

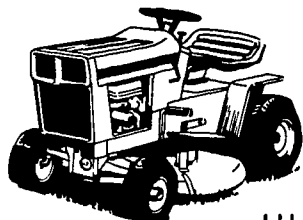
