Dry Milk Imports Authorized

Additional imports of 100 million pounds of nonfat dry milk have been authorized by President Nixon in order to assure ample supplies. The authorization was taken under Section 22(b) of the Agricultural Adjustment Act.

The authorization for 100 million pounds of nonfat dry milk follows similar actions earlier in the year, totalling 165 million pounds. Nonfat dry milk production has been below normal this year because of the decline in fluid milk production, but commercial demand has remained strong. With nonfat dry milk production now entering the period of seasonal decline, the additional imports should insure that supplies will remain fully adequate. Nonfat dry milk is used extensively by food processors, ice cream manufacturers, candy makers and the pharmaceutical industry. Prices have been gradually rising for some months, despite the authorization of additional imports.

The imports will be on a first come, first served basis, and must be entered by October 31; no licenses will be required. The maximum amount which an individual importer may bring in is limited to 2,500,000 pounds, this limitation is intended to prevent any importer from controlling a disproportionate share of the imports. The quota, in contrast to earlier temporary quotas, is allocated to countries of origin, as follows: Australia, 25 million pounds, New Zealand, 25 million pounds; Canada, 10 million pounds; and an aggregate of 40 million pounds to be shared among the member countries of the European Economic Community.

The emergency Section 22 action will, as provided by law, be subject to an investigation and report to the President by the U.S. Tariff Commission The investigation will include a public hearing at which interested parties may testify. An announcement by the Tariff Commission is expected in the near future.

Outdoor Cookery

When barbecung meat outdoors, Extension meat specialists at The Pennsylvania State University, suggest you trim fat from the edges to one-quarter or one-third inch thickness Also cut away large chunks of fat from inner sections of the meat. Slash the fat remaining around edges to prevent curling of meat And drain marinated meat, poultry and fish thoroughly before you cook them. If you're using a sauce, add it to each side after cooking


Metal Can Best for Storing Gasoline

The safest way to store gasoline is in a heavy metal safety can, reminds the Cooperative Extension Service Farm and Home Safety Committee of The Pennsylvania State University. The can should have a spring-locked lid that closes automatically to prevent escape of gasoline or fumes if it should be dropped.

Power Mowers are a Big Help Power mowers are helpful tools, but they can also be a menace. Always shut them off to empty the grass bag. Never refuel when motor is hot, and keep kids and pets away while mowing, reminds the Cooperative Extension Service and Home Safety Committee of Pennsylvania State The University.


When Cutting Gladioli Leave Foliage

When cutting gladioli for indoor arrangements, cut only the flower spike and leave most of the foliage on the plant until you lift the corms--about six weeks after the glads flower. Plants need the foliage for the corms to grow, remind Extension horticulturists at The Pennsylvania State University.
