

Pa. Broiler Up 5 pct.

Placements of broiler chicks in the Commonwealth during the week ending September 8, 1973 were 1,210,000. The placements were 5 percent above the corresponding week a year -earlier, and 9 percent below the previous week. Average placements during the past 10 weeks were 11 percent above a year earlier.

Settings for broiler chicks were

supplies fully adequate to ample with weights increasing in instances. Undertone steady.

Pool trucklot prices for Thursday arrival US Grade A 53-59, mostly 53-54; Plant Grade 51½-56, mostly 52-53.

1,970,000 - approximately the same as the previous week and 11 percent above the comparable period a year earlier. The current 3-week total of eggs is 11 percent above the same period a year ago.

Inshipments of broiler-type chicks during the past 10 weeks averaged 18,000 compared with 19,000 a year ago. Outshipments averaged 299,000 during the past 10 weeks, 13 percent above a year earlier.

Settings were 64,863,000 - 2 percent below the previous week and 1 percent above a year earlier. The current 3-week total of eggs set is 3 percent above the comparable period a year ago.
