Speakers, Topics Listed For NEPPCO Exposition

Two speakers with topics having strong impact on the national poultry industry have been added to the program of in-depth seminars scheduled for the three-day exposition of the Northeastern Poultry Producers Council.

The pair of experts will join more than a dozen others speaking to the theme of "Tomorrow...Will Wake You Up to the New Era in Agriculture" when the 14-state convention is staged here on October 30 through November 1 at the Hotel Hershey and the Hersheypark Arena.

Dried poultry waste, or

"anaphage", which promises to turn the industry's number one problem into a profitable new business, will be analyzed by the man who may be the nation's top expert on the subject, Dr. Howard C. Zindel, chairman of the department of poultry science at Michigan State University.

And "radicalism", the controversial "far-out" philosophy of innovations generally shunned by farmers, will be examined by Dr. L. M. Skamser, product group manager for the agricultural division of American Cyanamid Co.

The pair will share the attention of more than 1,000 in-

dustriemen from throughout the Northeast who will gather to probe such subjects as the best of the new merchandising ideas, the outlook for the industry, cost-controls, planning precision and insight into both price expectations and anticipated government regulations.

"Based on present-day research, feed costs and availability of some feed ingredients, the recycling of poultry excreta (as a feed ingredient) makes more sense than ever," Zindel says, "and it will be so utilized when the Food and Drug Administration gives its stamp of approval"

Skamser will remind industry men that "radicals ultimately determine the direction of our society and our economy. The prosperity and progress of the poultry industry could well depend upon how radical its leaders become."

The topics pursued by Skamser, a veteran of many battles with radicals himself, and by Zindel, who has researched and promoted the sometimes controversial program of feeding dried poultry waste to livestock, are expected to draw top attention at the big annual exposition

Because of the projected importance of the talks at Northeastern '73, NEPPCO will revert to its policy of staging educational sessions and exhibit hall openings during separate hours

We're really attempting to put a sliderule to Tomorrow," according to Hendrik Wentink, NEPPCO President. The talk sessions will share the center-stage with newly-conceived educational exhibits composed of outstanding data from around the world, as well as a newly-expanded commercial exposition housed this year in the spacious Hersheypark Arena

The after-hours activities at the famed resort will incorporate the famous arboretum, the oldtime museum, the well-known chocolate tour and the golf courses as well as such NEPPCO-related events as the banquet and entertainment.

FHA Program Is Extended

A one-year extension of the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) home loan guarantee program was given final congressional approval by the Senate Monday, just hours before the program would have died

The legislation was rushed through so there will be no lull in the FHA program, which would have expired Monday midnight in absence of congressional extension. The bill continues the program through October 1, 1974

The measure was approved by voice vote with only a few senators present, Sen William Proxmire, D-Wis., cast the only audible vote against it

Proxmire said it was "Unconscionable" that Congress would pass legislation which helps only those "30 to 40 per cent of Americans who can afford to buy their own homes" without helping those "who cannot afford to buy a home without some kind of government assistance"
