Ask the Old Farmer: Why did early Americans use chests and trunks in place of closets and cupboards? F. J., Clayton, Missouri. After the log cabin era,

Tex2s-Oklahoma: Variable cloudiness and hot through most of week; colder temperatures on weekend.


Rocky Mountain Region: First part of week clear and very warm; cooler latter part.


