Society 14

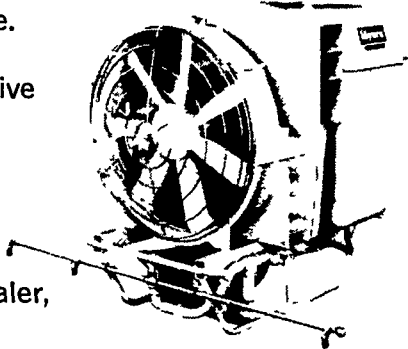
Farm Women Society 14 members and friends took a bus trip Wednesday, October 10, to Fort McHenry. The trip was in place of the regular meeting.

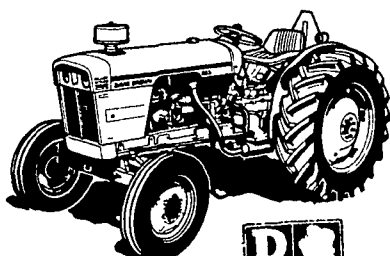

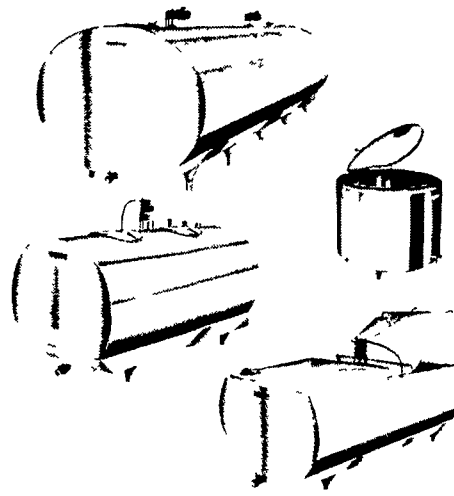

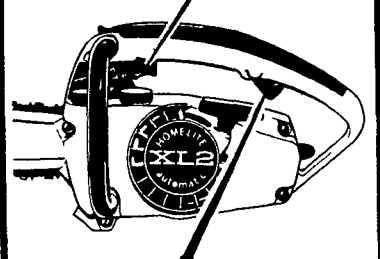
