After Greg had accepted his plaque for the county award, it was announced that he was also in the running for the same honor on the state level.

Every year, the Pennsylvania Holstein-Friesian Association names six finalists for state competition, three boys and three girls. Greg is one of the three boys in contention, and will be traveling to Penn State next week to compete for the state title.

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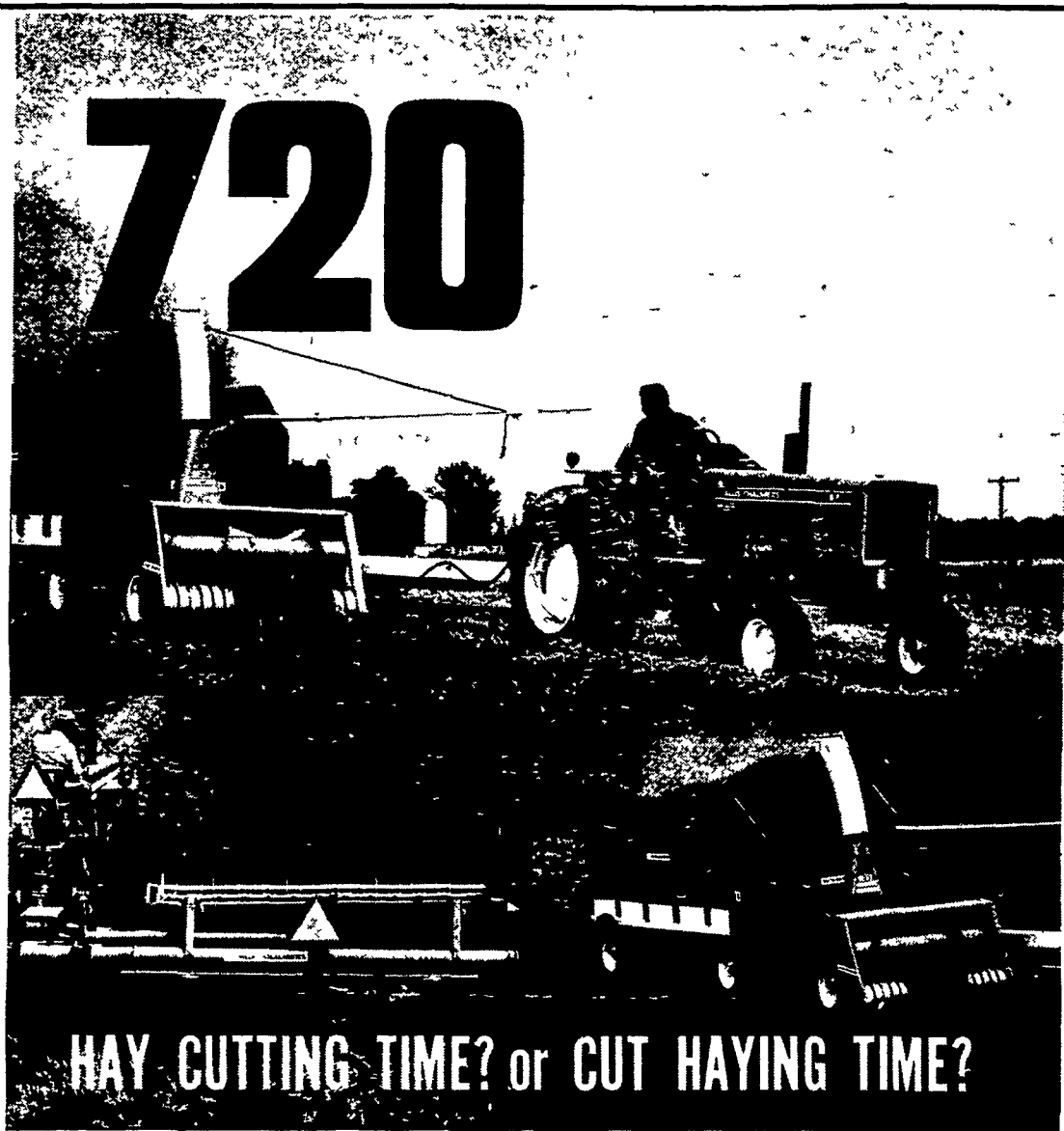
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
