

Inter-State Dairymen Plan Annual Meeting

The annual delegate meeting of Inter-State Milk Producers' Cooperative will be held Tuesday and Wednesday, November 13 and 14 at the Marriott Motor Hotel, City Line Avenue, Philadelphia. The meeting will be keyed to dairy farmers and their

problems. Home offices of the cooperative are in Southampton, PA.

Inter-State Milk Producers' Cooperative has approximately 3000 dairy farmer members in 24 districts in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland,

Virginia and West Virginia. These districts are divided into 77 locals whose 136 delegates will vote on resolutions and new business at Wednesday's session.

Tuesday morning's session will be devoted to reports by Lester C. Jones, president; Dr. James E. Honan, general manager; Dr. Paul E. Hand, economist; Florence C. Schultz, treasurer; Golden W. Davis, management assistant; Donald Copeland, counsel; Watson Buckman, director of transportation; and Boyd C. Gartley, director of member and public relations.

The banquet program on Tuesday evening will feature Dr. Dale Milligan, pastor, First Presbyterian Church, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, who has been active in the ministry since 1949. Entertainment will be provided by Constance Towers, who has appeared on Broadway, in motion pictures and on TV talk shows. Don Schriver, assistant director of public relations, Ohio

Farmers, Inc., will be toastmaster for the evening program.

A ladies meeting on Tuesday morning will present Rev. E. C. Mehle, followed by an afternoon of shopping either at King of Prussia Mall or Center City Philadelphia or an historical tour of Philadelphia.

Wednesday morning's activities will begin bright and early with the fourth annual Young Cooperator Breakfast, which will take place prior to the business session.

U.S. Looks For More Feed Exports To Eastern Europe

The United States may significantly step up shipments of oilseed cake and meal to Eastern Europe in the coming decade. The U.S. share of feed grain exports also may rise, although Eastern Europe's total grain import requirements may contract, according to a just-released report by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service.

Czechoslovakia, East Germany, Poland, Bulgaria, Hungary, Romania, and Yugoslavia imported 1.4 million tons of oilseed cake and meal a year during 1966-70. That figure could reach 3.6 million tons by 1980.

The seven countries are aiming at increased livestock output to meet their rising consumer and export demand for meat. Thus, protein feeds, particularly oilseed cake and meal, will be in strong demand.

At the same time, the report says, while total grain imports by the region may decrease from 4.4 million tons a year in 1966-70 to 3.0 million tons in 1980, U.S. grain exports may actually increase due to a continued strong import demand in the northern countries, Czechoslovakia, East Germany and Poland, and the changing composition of this demand in favor of feed grains—of which the U.S. is the largest supplier—and away from wheat.

Total grain production in Eastern Europe has been expanding rapidly. Grain production in the 1970's is projected to increase at an annual rate of 2.5 percent, and consumption at 2.2 percent.

Total agricultural production in Eastern Europe rose about 3 percent a year during the 1960's. For the 1970's, it may increase even faster, due partly to

liberalization of the marketing system, more realistic central planning, and increased agricultural investments and producer prices.

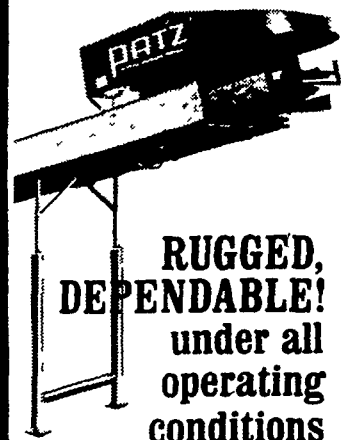
