

Dairymen Honor Dexter N. Putnam

Dexter N. Putnam, professor of dairy science extension at The Pennsylvania State University, has been named winner of the 1973 Pennsylvania Dairymen's Association Award of \$100 and an inscribed plaque "for valuable and noteworthy contributions to the state's dairy industry."

The award was presented to Mr. Putnam January 8 at the association's 103rd annual meeting in Harrisburg as part of the 58th Farm Show.

Since his appointment to the Penn State faculty in 1956, the award winner has been in charge of Dairy Herd

Improvement Association data processing. In this capacity he serves as liaison between the Dairy Science Extension Section and Penn State Data processing Center.

The dairy specialist developed new techniques to improve efficiency in production testing programs. Through his efforts, Pennsylvania became the first state to adopt the Test Interval Method of calculating DHIA records, and the first state to provide the Alternate AM-PM Monthly Testing Program. The two new milk testing services were developed to save DHIA supervisors time and continue to maintain accurate records. Following final adoption of these two programs, a Central Milk Testing Laboratory was established on the Penn

State campus to test all of the state's DHIA samples.

Mr. Putnam also has the responsibility of designing all forms for DHIA records. He teaches supervisors, dairymen, county agents, and dairy service personnel how to interpret the data provided and how to use it for effective dairy herd

FHA Allocates Loaning Funds

The allocation of rural development loan funds for Pennsylvania for fiscal year 1974, will amount to \$76,605,000, Penrose Hallowell, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration (FHA), announced recently.

Through FHA, the U. S. Department of Agriculture serves farmers, rural residents and towns of up to

10,000 population with farm ownership and operating, housing and community facility loans. In towns below 50,000 or open country, loans are available to develop business and industry.

Current allocations for FHA's farmer programs in Pennsylvania provide \$5,000,000 for farm ownership loans and an additional \$4,500,000 for farm operating loans. No apportionment of funds was made for farm emergency loans because of the proviso that "emergency loans in amounts necessary to meet the needs resulting from natural disasters" would be provided.

Under the community services programs, allocations have been made in four separate categories: \$22,090,000 for water and waste disposal loans; \$2,315,000 for community facilities loans; \$8,215,000 for business and industrial loans; and \$385,000 for in-

dustrial development grants. Apportionments for FHA's rural housing program were divided between single family dwellings and rural rental housing. The allocation of housing funds for low interest loans to low income families designated \$8,050,000 to be used for loans to purchase and renovate existing dwellings and \$7,000,000 for construction of new homes. \$16,050,000 was provided for regular, full interest individual housing loans.

Rental housing loan funds of \$3,000,000 are divided so about two-thirds goes for units with subsidized rents, the remainder for units with regular rent payments.
