Tobacco

What could be billed as the Harrisburg edition of the Lancaster County Tobacco Show was topped this year by a pair of very familiar names. Roy M. Rohrer, Strasburg RD1, showed the grand champion wrapper sample, while grand champion filler honors went to Arthur E. Reist, 1050 Eden Road, Lancaster.

In 4-H competition, Alfred G. Reist, Arthur's twin brother, exhibited the champion wrapper, and Arthur, the champion filler. Roy Dohner, Elizabethtown RD1, won the

championship in vocational wrapper judging competition, and James Risser, Lancaster RD2, won in vocational filler classes.

Corn York County corn producers captured three championships in corn judging competition at the Farm Show.

Samuel E. Conley, Etters RD1, captured championships in the 10-ear hybrid dent and 30-ear hybrid dent classes in District I. Robert Kilgore, Airville, exhibited the championship 10-ear single cross hybrid in District II competition.

Donald J. Wack, of RD1, Zelenople, Butler County, showed the top 10-ear hybrid dent exhibit, and Shawn Henley, Lebanon RD3 with a 10-ear open pollinated exhibit, won in statewide competition.

Daniel A. Brubaker, Ephrata RD1 Lancaster County, captured the 30-ear open pollinated championship.

A York County youth, Glenn Crowl, Airville RD2, exhibited the top sample in District 1 4-H competition. And an Airville RD1 youth, Richard Kilgore, won the District 1 FFA championship in hybrid dent corn classes.

Honey

The York County Beekeepers Association placed first in the collective county honey exhibit at the Farm Show. The York County group makes its headquarters at York RD5.

C. Edward Graybill, of 432 W. Orange St., Lititz, Lancaster County, took the championship in the individual exhibit division.

The top specialty pack was exhibited by Daniel A. Brubaker, of RD1, Ephrata, Lancaster County, and the best exhibit of comb honey was shown by Fred Rich, of 225 Rittenhouse Road, Royersford, Montgomery County. The best exhibit of extracted honey was exhibited by Earl V. Miller, of RD3, Dover, York County.

In 4-H honey competition, area youths captured two of the top four placings. John Brenner, Lititz RD3, Lancaster County, won the white extracted class, while the light amber extracted sample was exhibited by Matthew Miller, Dover RD3, York County.

Donald Weidman, 1818 Kembrook Road, Lebanon, captured first place FFA honors for his amber extracted example. Another first prize in FFA competition went to William Spahr, Dover RD1, for his entry in the dark amber extracted division.

Free Folder Offered By 'First Step'

A free folder for parents, "Understanding Your Child", is available from FIRST STEP, a developmental disabilities aid and identification program being conducted by the Pennsylvania Association for Retarded Citizens.

"Understanding Your Child" was written and produced by FIRST STEP to give parents some general guidelines for the measurement of their child's development. It explains what should be done if it is suspected that a child is not developing as he should, and contains basic information on infant programs, and what a parent can expect from infant stimulation.

The importance of identifying and helping special children in the critical first few years of life is the emphasis of FIRST STEP, and the newly available folder is part of a year-long continuing education program for parents, persons interested in special children, (either professionally or personally) and infant-toddler program employees and directors. Additional materials will be made available from time to time.

Seminars for professionals, parents, and interested lay people will be held throughout the state -- the first on February 5 at the Penn Harris Motor Inn, Camp Hill. Following the seminars, efforts will be made to contact parents of infants and children with suspected developmental disabilities through publicity and public service advertising.

The FIRST STEP program is a one-year project Federally funded by The Developmental Disabilities Council through Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare.
