Liver and Onions

Use as much liver as your family needs. Brown on both sides to seal. Place in skillet. Top with sliced onions and mushrooms. Cover meat, etc. with tomato juice diluted with one half to 1 cup water and a dash of Worcestershire sauce. Roast at 350 degrees for one to one and a half hours.

 - 1 large (9 ounce) container of whipped topping
- Mix well and chill.

Out of This World Cake

- 2 sticks margarine melted
 - 1 bag (13 3/4 ounces graham cracker crumbs)
 - 4 eggs
 - 1 cup milk
 - 2 cups granulated sugar
 - 1 cup coconut
 - 1 cup chopped nuts
 - 2 teaspoons baking powder
 - 1 medium can drained crushed pineapple
- Mix well. Bake in long pan at 350 degrees for 35 to 45 minutes.
