NEST RUN EGGS

Prices are from Egg Clearinghouse, Inc., (ECI) Durham, N.H. and reflect trading prices for gradeable nest run eggs (GNR) on ECI, a nationwide trading center for producers, packers and marketers. GNR eggs are classified by weight in 30-dozen cases, and traded in lots of either 300 or 750 cases. Prices are FOB buyers dock, and are computed Tuesday and Thursday of each week. This week's prices for each classification were:

Ohio Shows Power at Penn Winternationals

Over 200 tractor pullers from some 15 states competed for over \$24,000 in purse money at the 1974 Penn Winternationals Tractor Pulls held Jan. 17-19 at the Farm Show Arena in Harrisburg.

The event was sponsored by Trojan Seed Company in cooperation with the National Tractor Pullers Association. Three classes of competition were held Thursday night, Jan. 17. Below are the results of two of those classes, the 5,000 pound Super Stock and the 9,000 pound Modified.

The top five contestants in the 5,000 pound Super Stock class are all from Ohio. They are:

- First: Bob Bussey, Sr., of North Canton, Ohio, driving an Oliver 88 - full pull, won 153'4" in pull off.
- Second: Steve Seaburn, Sedalia, Ohio driving an International 460 - full pull, second place in pull off at 162'2".
- Third: Joe Shaner of Millersport, Ohio, driving an Oliver 88, finishing 178'6".
- Fourth: Sam Left of Hillsboro, Ohio, driving a Cockshut 40, finishing 178'2".
- Fifth: Cutis Close of Bellevue, Ohio driving an International 460, finishing 141'7".

In the 9,000 Pound Modified Class, two Pennsylvania men placed 11th and 13th. The first five are as follows:

- First: Lloyd McVey of Oakwood, Ill., driving a Massey 55 with a 426 Chrysler hemi engine, pull 146'2".
- Second: Tom Colchain of Decatur, Ind., driving a Coop E4 with a 427 Chevy engine. Distance 136'7".
- Third: Mike Rittinger of Circleville, Ohio, driving an International M with a Lincoln 430 engine, pulled 132'8".
- Fourth: David Banter of Warren, Ind. driving a Cockshut 40 with a 427 Chevy

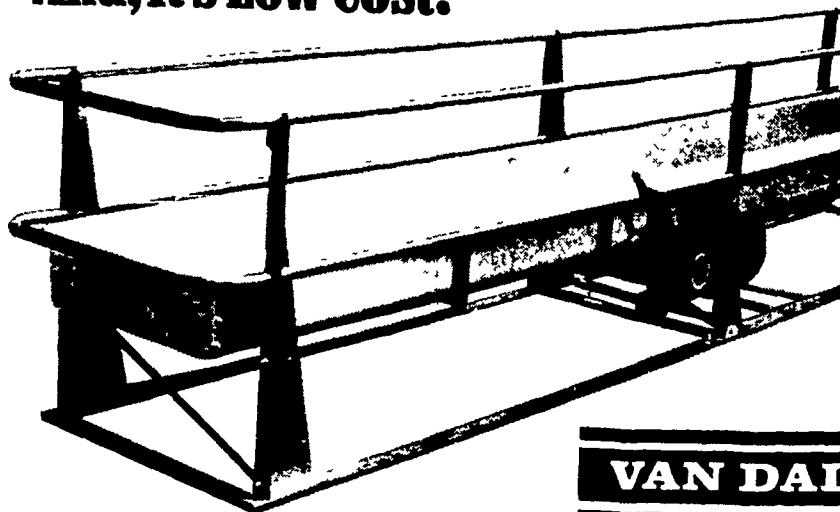
