NEST RUN EGGS

Prices are from Egg Clearinghouse, Inc., (ECI) Durham, N.H. and reflect trading prices for gradeable nest run eggs (GNR) on ECI, a nationwide trading center for producers, packers and marketers. GNR eggs are classified by weight in 30-dozen cases, and traded in lots of either 300 or 750 cases. Prices are FOB buyers dock, and are computed Tuesday and Thursday of each week. (Continued From Page 1) the cooperative, squelched rumors that the directors were considering dropping small producers. "We're definitely not dropping anybody," he said. "We are, however, going to work on ways to increase direct hauling."

Manager Sim Horton had the comforting message that cooperative members would

be paid as much or more for their milk as non-members were getting from local producers. All of the Mount Joy group's output is marketed through the Lehigh Cooperative in Allentown.

Richard Allison, Lehigh president, in his address to the group illuminated the dark mysteries of base excess plans, support price calculations, the Minnesota-Wisconsin series, the Commodity Credit Corporation role in surplus milk marketing, and farm income parity.

One new member was elected to the cooperative's board of directors during the meeting. He is Preston Newcomer, Mount Joy RD1, and he will serve a three-year term. Reelected to a three-year term was Lewis Bixler, Marietta RD1. Reelected to a one-year term was Albert Fry, Jr., Manheim RD2.
