

Meat Outlook Conference Slated for Wednesday

The outlook for livestock and meat from now through 1975 is the subject of a public affairs seminar to be conducted Wednesday, February 20 at 7:30 p.m. at Lancaster's Farm and Home Center.

Featured speaker at the program will be Harrell F. DeGraff, former president of the American Meat Institute in Chicago.

DeGraff, born on a farm in western New York, was Professor of Land Economics, College of Agriculture, Cornell University, 1941-1951; H. E. Babcock Professor of Food Economics, Graduate School of Nutrition, Cornell University, 1951-1962; and Executive Vice-President, American Meat Institute, Chicago, 1962-63; and President, 1963-1973.

Dr. DeGraff has worked with the Rockefeller Development Program in Mexico, 1952; in Columbia, 1953; and as a consultant with the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture 1955-1960.

He has served as a member of the Agricultural Board, National Academy of Sciences-National Research Council; Chairman, Advisory Council, New York State College of Agriculture; member, Consumer Affairs Committee, U. S. Chamber of Commerce; member, Board of Trustees, Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York; and member, Board of Directors, George A. Hormel & Co., Austin, Minnesota.
