Mrs. Glenn Wenger conducted the group in a series of exercises and explained the value for various parts of the body.

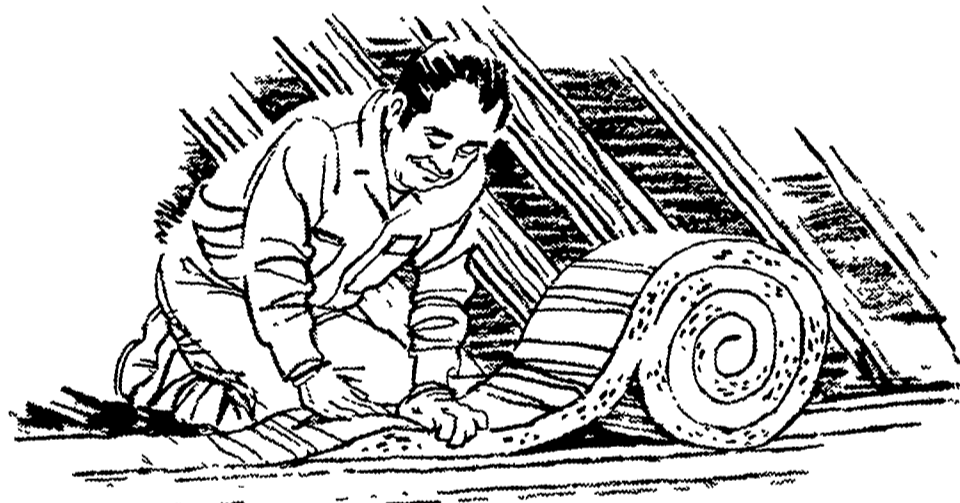
The next meeting will be a tour of Hickory Farms of Ohio April 8. Members are asked to meet at Park City at 10:15.
