Wentink Blasts FTC Rumors

"As one who feels we're in according to Hendrik a real fight, and as a Pennsylvanian, it seems appropriate for me to quote Benjamin Franklin's observation to John Hancock on the occasion of the signing of the Declaration of Independence: 'We must all hang together, else we shall all hang separately.' It is no different in our NCEN battle--or in any other battle. Internal divisiveness is weakening and energies expended in warfare among ourselves are not available to be directed at the enemy,"

Wentink, chairman of the National Commission on Egg Nutrition.

The new NCEN chairman, an executive of the Pennfield Corporation, issued the statement in response to what he termed erroneous reports on industry and NCEN strategies in the face of complaints to the FTC about NCEN advertising.

"Having heard and read some of these unfortunate rumors, I think it's necessary for me to set the record straight," Wentink

"I hope the industry will understand from the very beginning of my chairmanship that, in my opinion, NCEN is not indulging in idle polemics: we are engaged in a program to be informative to the American people on what we consider to be a topic of vital importance. We are not doing this for profit and we are using our fundamental rights of free speech to make known our point of view.

"But it is our point of view--and only we may express it. I have heard and read halftruths and out-and-out errors about NCEN's position, plans and strategies. It is a fact that even the half-truths were in the minority.

"It is my intention to address myself directly to some of these rumors because I feel we are operating from a position of strength and that the facts are with us.

"There is no truth to the statement that NCEN plans 'watered-down' versions of its advertising. We feel, as our future ads will state, that there is no proof that eating eggs will increase the risk of heart attack,' and we're not afraid to say so. The assertion in some quarters that NCEN plans to 'placate' the FTC is, quite simply, absurd. As a Federal regulatory agency, the FTC has specific, definite duties to perform and the use of the word 'placate' is gratuitously insulting, both to NCEN and to the FTC.
"One poorly informed

source went so far as to suggest that legal counsel advised that we ignore the FTC's request for information about our advertising. Another rumor stated that counsel said our position was 'idefensible.' Still another--totally unfounded, as are they all-held that those who have supported NCEN thus far will be personally liable if any sort of FTC decision is directed against NCEN. This is purest hogwash.

'Ordinarily, in this sort of controversy, one would not dignify absurdities such as these to the extent of quoting them even to refute them. But mistaken or irresponsible statements will damage NCEN's cause and I intend that this will not happen. No one else will speak for NCEN. NCEN is quite capable of speaking for itself, either through the chairman or our legal or public relations counsel. Rumors-any rumors-are not true because it is our intention to issue clear statements. And these will surely have some basis in law. Further, our plans for what we will and what we won't do will not be subjects for public debate. We consider any policy other than keeping our strategies to ourselves to be meffectual, amateurish-or both.




