Michael Nolan, Columbus, Ohio, has been named a Program Director for Holstein-Friesian Association of America in Eastern Pennsylvania effective July 1. He will replace Carl Brown, who has returned to VPI for his PhD.

As a Program Director, Nolan will be responsible for the coordination of all Holstein programs and services and the many Pennsylvania Holstein activities. His efforts to coordinate breed activities in Eastern Pennsylvania will involve close work with state boards of directors, major committees and local club officers as well as personal on-the-farm visits and group contacts.

Nolan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Nolan, Wakeman, Ohio, will graduate from Ohio State University in June.

Born and raised on a Registered Holstein dairy farm, Nolan has been active with Holsteins his entire life. He presently owns 25 head.

Active in 4-H, Nolan was first runnerup in the Outstanding Ohio Holstein boy contest in 1971 and was on the Junior Association Board

of Directors in 1972. He was also 4th overall and high in oral reasons at the Pennsylvania All-American Dairy Judging contest in 1972.

While attending Ohio State with a major in Dairy Science, Nolan has been participating in numerous activities including membership in the Dairy Science Club and serving as its President, a member of the dairy judging team, 1st Vice President of the National American Dairy Science Association, President of Alpha Gamma Sigma Agricultural fraternity, and a member of Ag Council, University chorus, Inter Fraternity Council and Greek Week Chairman.

He is also active in St. Mary's Catholic Church and Choir.

Currently single, Nolan will relocate in the Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania area on July 1.

farmer, a dairy farm manager, herdsman, or dairy farm owner during the current year, or the contestant be the owner of more than one dairy animal prior to May 1, 1974.

3. Have completed her junior year of high school and will not reach her 21st birthday by September 1 of the year of the contest.

4. She must be single and never married.

5. Have parent's or guardian's consent.

6. Former local winners not eligible.

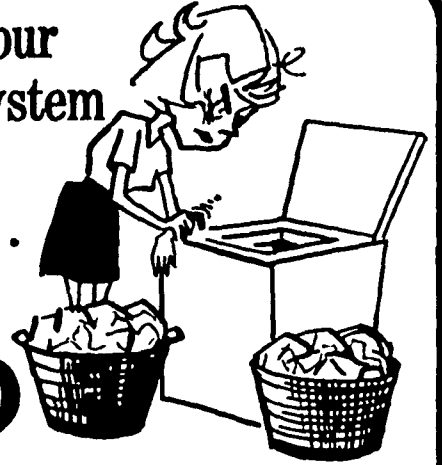


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Annual Meet Held By E-Town FFA

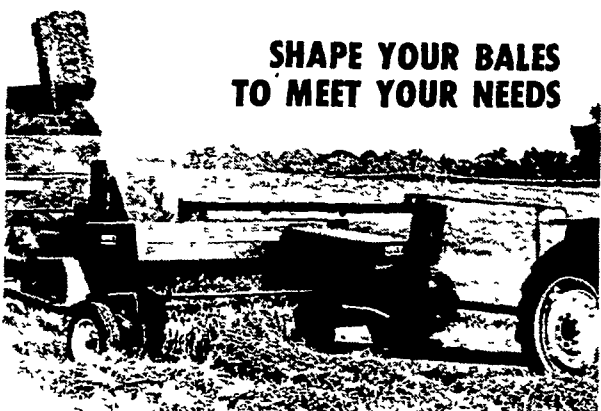
